Pulitzer Center Campus Consortium Forging dynamic relationships with colleges and universities

The Campus Consortium initiative is a partnership between the Pulitzer Center and universities and colleges to engage students and academics on the critical global issues of our time. The partnership includes a series of visits by Pulitzer Center journalist grantees who present their reporting in courses and public forums with the goal inspiring an interdisciplinary dialogue. The initiative also provides opportunities for students to report from around the world and learn how to better explain these issues to broad audiences. We are proud of our growing network of diverse partners—from small liberal arts and community colleges and to large state universities.

Campus Visits

The Center coordinates with each Campus Consortium partner on how best to launch the program and develop a series of visits by journalists. Partners have also opted to develop alternative programming with the Pulitzer Center, from day-long forums to year-long forcredit seminars.



The Center is eager for university departments to work together on

programming to foster broader discussions and more nuanced analysis of concerns that span disciplines, from journalism and business to law, religion and public health. This interdisciplinary approach benefits from the diverse topics Pulitzer Center grantees report on, from the local costs of global goods and the war in Afghanistan, to maternal health, HIV/AIDS and cancer in the developing world.

Student Reporting Fellowships

Students at full Campus Consortium member schools compete for Pulitzer Center fellowships to undertake international reporting projects they propose. Center staff and journalists act as mentors. Final products are featured on the Pulitzer Center website, with the possibility of publication via other news-media outlets. The Pulitzer Center also holds an annual fellows weekend in Washington, DC, to expose them to the work of other fellows, provide an opportunity to network with professional journalists and editors, and further broaden the students' horizons.

Costs

The cost to a Campus Consortium partner is between \$10,000 and \$15,000 per year. Cost for international programs may range higher than this average. Modified Consortium partnerships are possible depending on campus needs and scope of planned activities. At least \$2,000 of the funding is reserved for the student reporting fellowship. The Center provides logistical and promotional support for Campus Consortium programming and mentorship for all student fellows via professional journalists and inhouse staff from the onset of the projects through to completion.
