Should Be***

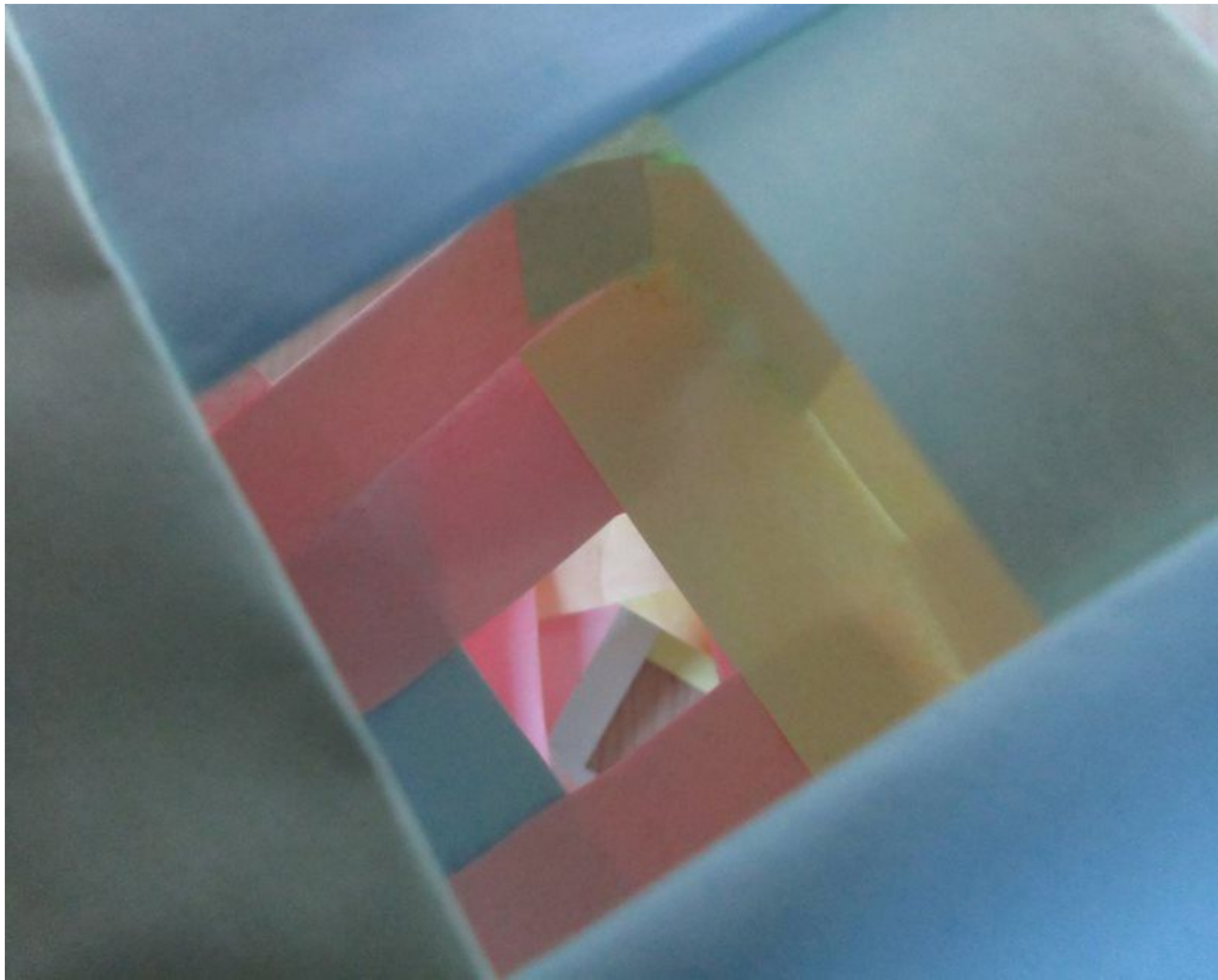

A Study of Lines in the Stairs

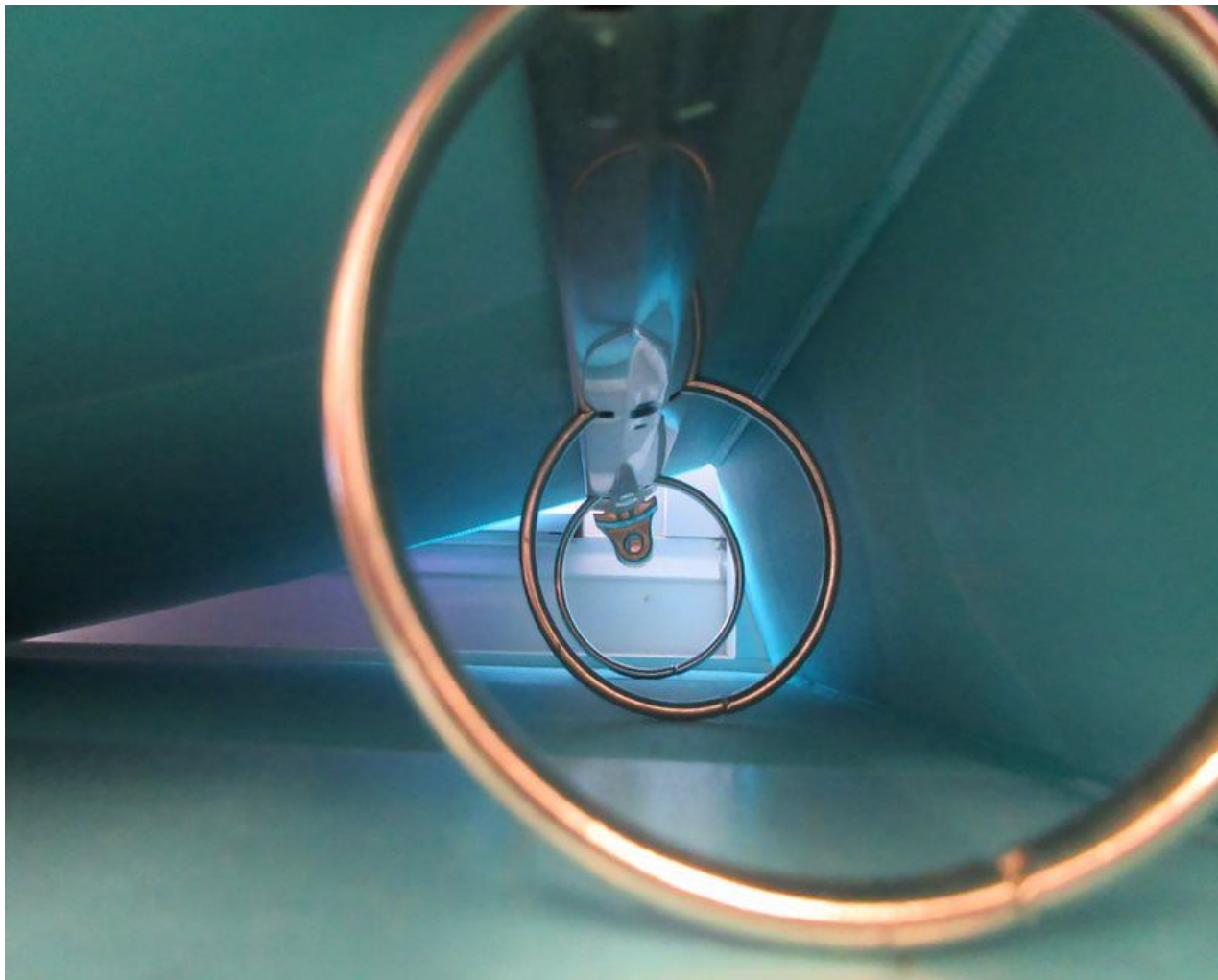
Walking up and down these stairs every day is exhausting, now I can at least enjoy the lines as I climb. Top of the third floor, looking down.

Binder Rings, A New Perspective

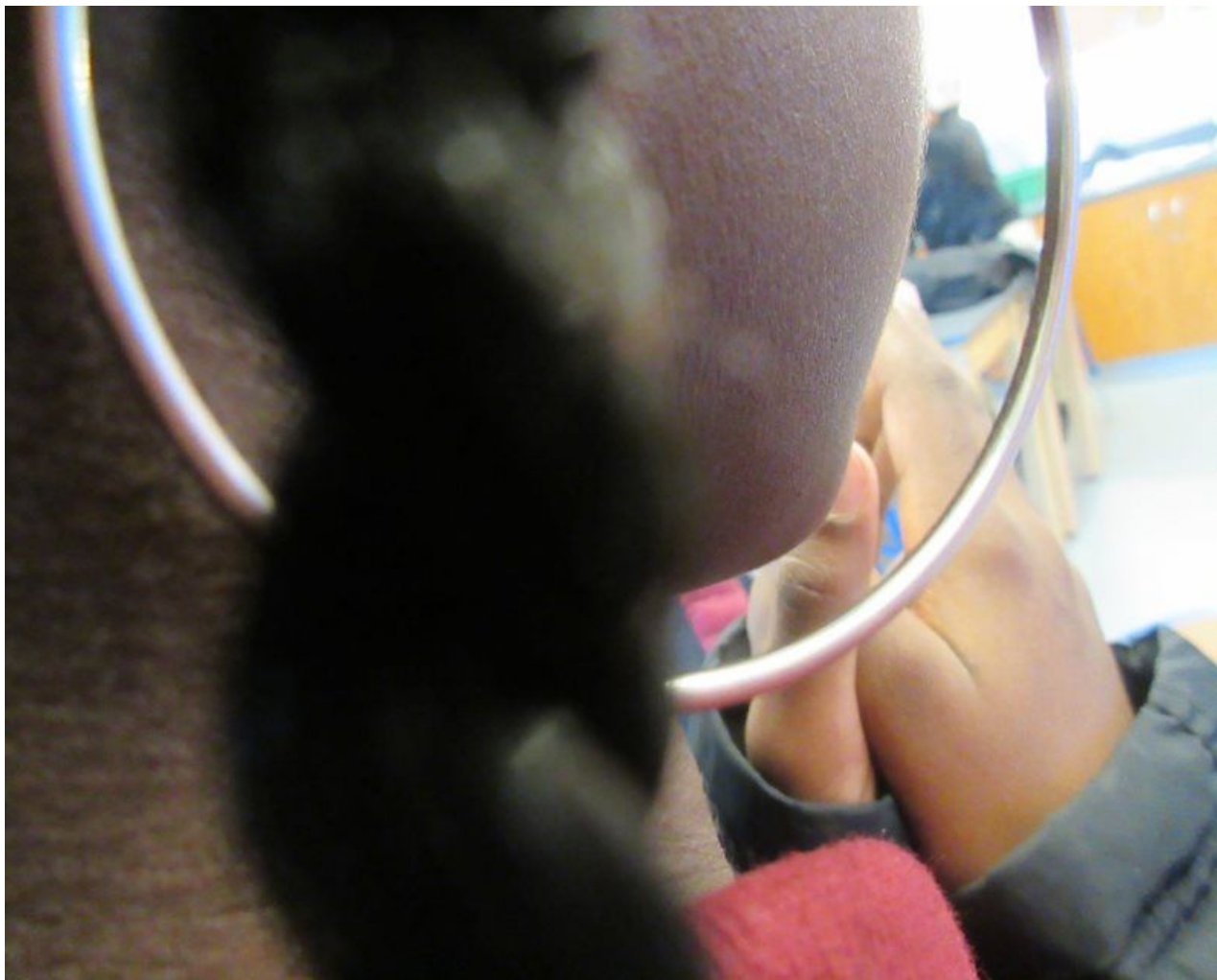
The challenge was finding examples of leading lines or identifiable shapes around the art room, and I found an example of both working together to make an interesting composition of a pretty boring object: a binder.
