



You get to make a story quilt about one of your head, heart or hands stories!








Day 2






What is a story you have about using your heart?




Today: draw YOUR story about using your head, heart or hands!

- 4. Draw details that show your **plot/action** (what is happening in your story)




The THEME of your painting is either: Head, Heart, or Hands.


