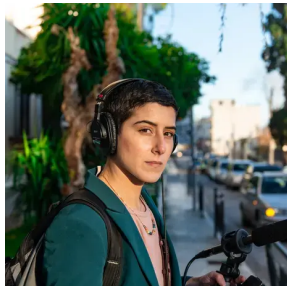


Gender; Racial Justice



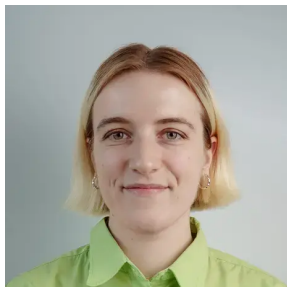
