The Department of Homeland Security offered \$24.3 billion to local and statewide police departments.

And it has only been used to keep the population at bay.

"The Defense Department has transferred excess or unused equipment to state and local law enforcement agencies. Therefore, over 6,500 law enforcement agencies across the country have acquired more than \$7 billion worth of guns, helicopters, armored vehicles and ammunition." (McCartney, A., 2020)



The funding has been utilized to provide local police with high-grade military equipment.

## What would local police need military equipment for?

A particular case was seen in Baltimore, Maryland.

A new aerial surveillance program has been tested by the local police, while monitoring the movements of every citizen of Baltimore.

"After more than 700 hours aloft over the city, just one arrest has been made with aid from the program's imagery data... Meanwhile, major Black Lives Matter protests have been among public street activities widely captured and recorded." (Cavanaugh Simpson, J., 2020).



The program was designed to compile data for criminal records. Only one successful arrest has been recorded, however, the plane has been seen actively monitoring the movements of BLM protestors.



The police is not receiving money to protect the people, but to obtain more power over them.
